## Meet Your Neighbor: Vivian and Ed Fleming

For six years, I put my child's life in the hands of another person and never gave it a thought. Vivian Fleming drove the school bus from my house to Delaware Township School. At the same time, the Township's safety and security were in the hands of Ed Fleming, Chief of Police.

Ed's parents were from Stockton and Lambertville. They moved to Sergeantsville in the 1950's, where Ed grew up, going to Delaware Township and Hunterdon Central schools. He worked at Shop Rite, and later Laneco in Clinton, (a place that was like Wal-Mart). Vivian, who came from Bloomsbury, worked at Laneco as well. They met, had a whirlwind romance and were engaged three months later.

In 1973, Ed began working at the Delaware Township Police Department part-time. In 1977 he went to the New Jersey State Police Academy for municipal officers.

Ed and Vivian married in 1978 and moved to the Kean property after a chance encounter with the owner. On Christmas Eve 1977, Ed, working part-time for the Police Department, was asked to stop by the Kean farm because there were poachers. Stewart Kean met him there and during the course of the investigation, asked if he knew anyone looking to rent a house. Stuart showed him a small cabin which he had for rent and Ed rented it.

Before they moved in, Kean called Ed about the cabin. He showed him a much larger 2-story house near his own house for the same rental price as the cabin. But it had a stipulation. Because the Keans were away a lot, Ed had to park his police car in plain sight in the driveway. Ed readily agreed. "The Keans," he says, "were the nicest people you could find to live next to."

Vivian worked for the "Lazy K," a horse supply store. First she worked in the store. When daughters Terah and Heather were born, she began doing piece work at home, making and sewing bridles and girths, cross-ties and other horse paraphernalia for the store.

In 1988 Vivian started driving a school bus for Delaware Township, becoming Bus Coordinator/Bus Driver in 1998. She retired in 2014. "I just love driving buses," Vivian says. "I have no problem backing up a bus. A car, maybe," she laughs, "but never a bus." She continues to drive as a substitute for Hunterdon Central.

Ed retired in 2001 having worked 27.5 years for the Township, including 18 years as Chief of Police. Throughout that time and still today, he is a volunteer fireman with the Sergeantsville Volunteer Fire Company. In his 43 years of volunteering, he has held all titles including Fire Chief. Presently he is Deputy Chief.

Vivian and Ed are still active in the community.

Their two daughters, Terah and Heather, are married and live in Delaware Township and Kingwood. They have five grandchildren ages 4-8. They all remain close; every Friday night and most holidays they get together at Ed and Vivian's house for dinner. Their lives are full and busy.

Says Ed, "Pretty much now our lives are fire-house fund-raising functions, such as Breakfasts and Dinners and the Comedy Night. And the support team" (who come out during a fire and offer support to the victims). About retirement, Ed says, "I don't miss the job as much as I miss the people. Community and the Township were all very supportive. But now, with the Firehouse, every Wednesday night you get together with people you know, for a function or a drill, working together to get the job done. Like the good old days with the Police. It's a great thing to preserve."

"We retired, but we keep busy," says Vivian. "We go to friend's houses, to ball games, and to all the Firehouse functions. And now it's nice because you can just pick up and go whenever you want. You don't have to wait for a weekend."

"It's been a great run," says Ed. "All of it. From our jobs, the area where we lived (and still do) the community and the people of the community. We have great memories we can always talk about."

### Early Reminder: Dog/Cat License Renewals January 1, 2018 thru February 28, 2018

To renew your dog and/or cat license for 2018, applications must be received after January 1 and postmarked before February 28. Please do not submit the renew request before January 1. There is also a drop off box at the police station next to the brick walkway available 24/7 before Feb. 28.

Licensing applications can be found on the Township website, at the Police station (visit Monday through Friday, between 8am and 3pm), and at the free rabies clinic December 2, 10 am to 12 noon at the Township garage. If your application is not postmarked by February 28, beginning March 1, 2018 late charges will be added. There are no exceptions. If you have tenants on your property, please let them know.

## St. Baldrick's Fundraiser Raises \$52,000

It's incredible what a group of caring people can do when we put our heads together. On September 24, we shaved over 80 heads, hosted an incredibly successful auction and ended the day contributing more than \$52,000 to finding cures for childhood cancers. The St. Baldrick's Foundation is the largest private funder of childhood cancer research grants, awarding more than \$200 million to support the development of childhood cancer treatments that are as unique as each child. This is a volunteer-driven charity, that keeps fundraising costs low and grants high. In five short years we have raised \$264,000 for much needed childhood cancer research, have funded three promising research projects, one of which played a part in securing approval of a new medication for Graft vs. Host Disease, and have locally raised awareness of childhood cancer.

## Free Rabies Clinic December 2, 10 am to 12 Noon

You are welcome to attend the free rabies clinic at the Township Public Works Department on December 2 from 10:00 to 12:00 noon. Pets must be on a leash or in a carrier. You can obtain a three-year rabies vaccination for pets one year old and over, or a one-year vaccination for pets under a year old.

PLEASE CHECK YOUR RABIES CERTIFICATE TO SEE IF YOUR PET NEEDS A VACCINATION. Your current rabies shot CANNOT EXPIRE BEFORE NOVEMBER 1, 2018. For example, if your rabies certificate expires 8/16/18 your pet needs to be vaccinated before you can receive the license. ## Tree Notes

I have a short note on trees in my office that says, "A man does not plant a tree for himself, he plants it for all humanity."

With that thought in mind, are you ready to understand what it means to start a companion planting? As New Jersey's newest State Pest, the Emerald Ash Borer (*Agrilus planipennis*) is working its way through the local ash tree population. How do we prepare for the change in the local landscape?

Take a drive through your local roads and take a look at the trees individually, how many of those are ash tree? How many of these will be gone? How many of these will need to be replaced? What is the cost to society, or property owners? How should we plan?

To attempt to do this, we need to understand the true succession of a growing forest. If Mother Nature were left alone, ash trees would not be a "Climax Species" in a young forest. Ash trees would grow and establish themselves so that other families of tree species could also establish themselves.

Mother Nature created a replacement program for the trees in her forest. The current deer population and the trend to manicure our forests prevents the germination of the next wave of tree population.

As the ash tree population continues to decline, we as stewards, need to step in and begin planting the next groups of trees now as companions to the trees that are in decline.

Then we can fulfill the statement: "The tree we plant today is planted for humanity."

## Energy Assistance

They will be able to give you information about eligibility requirements and type of heating assistance available.

Rain or shine, Hunterdon County will host a Hazardous Waste Clean Up Day on March 10, 2018, from 9:00am to 1:00pm, at the Route 12 County Complex, 314 Route 12, Flemington NJ 08822. Waste that will be accepted includes: used motor oil, automotive batteries, anti-freeze, fire extinguishers, paint, insecticides, pesticides, pool chemicals, fluorescent light tubes, and compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs). Limitations apply.

Among the items the County will NOT accept: Computers, monitors, propane or any compressed gas tanks, radioactive materials, and explosives.

## Pipeline Update

The Pipeline Subcommittee completed its review of all of the comments that the Township had previously submitted to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) about the proposed PennEast pipeline and compared that list to the responses received from PennEast.

In addition, the Subcommittee met with representatives from the Rosemont Water Company to learn more about their concerns regarding the potential siting of the pipeline in the area from which their community well draws its water (also known as the wellhead protection area). The Subcommittee recompiled all comments for which no responses were received, including those regarding the Rosemont Water Company, and resubmitted them to FERC, together with the 88 issues that FERC had previously identified and another letter of concern from the Township.

In addition, the Township passed a resolution intended for the Delaware and Raritan Basin Commission (DRBC). The Resolution asks that the DRBC give equal time and access to the Township's experts and community representatives as has been giving to PennEast; that DRBC not allow PennEast to respond on behalf of the DRBC to public comments regarding the project; that DRBC clarify what its jurisdiction is regarding the pipeline; and requests confirmation that the DRBC will not hold hearings until it declares PennEast's application materials complete.

At this time, FERC has not made a decision on the pipeline.
