Meet Your Neighbor: Bob Schremser

B ob Schremser is a man of many interests, chief among them music. A guitar player since High School, he played in a number of different groups over the years which eventually led to the founding of The Raven Rock Rounders in 2001, a country, blues, rock, and novelty song band in which he plays the guitar, mandolin, and dulcimer. Over the years they have played at a long list of venues in and around the area and performed at various local festivals and street fairs. They once opened for Peter Tork of the Monkeys at the Record Collector Store in Bordentown.

About 40 years ago, Bob started hosting a radio show from what is now the College of New Jersey, formerly Trenton State College. His show, known as "Kaleidoscope," features everything from the familiar to the forgotten, the obvious to the obscure, the best of the psychedelic 60s and beyond. It airs on Sunday evenings from 6:00 to 8:00 (91.3 FM Mercer/Bucks area or WTSR.org) and focuses on the progressive music sounds of the 60s, particularly those which display musicianship, but he explores the sounds of other eras as well.

Over the years Bob has been fortunate to meet and/or interview an impressive number of 1960s luminaries, including Dr. Timothy Leary while filling in as a DJ at City Gardens and a four hour on-air interview with Abbie Hoffman in 1988. He has interviewed and played in various venues with Stampel and Weber of the Holy Modal Rounders and appeared in their documentary "Bound To Lose," released in 2006.

Bob graduated from Trenton State College and has a Masters Degree in English. As an undergraduate he worked on the WTSR news staff and served as News Director. It was in this capacity he met and interviewed Congressman Chris Smith and covered former Congresswoman Millicent Fenwick's election night concession speech in 1982.

Retirement in 2021 is on the horizon for Bob. For the past 38 years he has worked for the New Jersey Civil Service Commission as a Personnel and Labor analyst doing technical writing in the area of Public Safety Recruitment and Testing.

His many interests and activities will keep him more than busy in retirement. Pre-pandemic, Bob enjoyed road trips through the Eastern US, and attended music festivals. These days he stays closer to home where he enjoys hiking, fishing, and reading, a very important pastime for him. Also, as he puts it, he has collections of collections. It is not too surprising that he collects CDs, LPs, DVDs, musical instruments, and books but vintage space toys? The man has many dimensions.

A resident of Delaware Township since 1996, Bob and his rescue dog Cheyenne and two cats, Sally Sue and Oscar Wilde, currently live in a building that was once a secret naval factory during WWII — a machine shop assembling water-tight doors for submarines. This was also the home of Chet Huntley of NBC's Huntley-Brinkley Report during the 1960s.

t a meeting in November, the Township Committee A t a meeting in November, the Lennie as they congratulated Alex and Ellen Jeyschune as they were awarded the 2020 Volunteer of the Year Award. In March, as the pandemic began to hit New Jersey, the Jeyschunes worked with the Colalillos from Flemington Shoprite on a plan to provide shopping services to Seniors to help keep them from having to leave their homes. The Jeyshunes recruited 38 volunteers from throughout our community to help with this endeavor. From the middle of March through the middle of June (a period of 85 days), volunteers processed and delivered 352 shopping orders to 137 homes throughout Hunterdon and Somerset Counties as well as to New Hope, Pennsylvania. This included taking orders, shopping for the groceries, and completing home deliveries. The actions of the Jeyschunes and the many volunteers who helped with this project are wonderful examples of the many selfless individuals who have helped make this time bearable. Open Space and Recreation Money

During the past several months, Delaware Township has been discussing Township open space funds and their possible use for maintenance purposes. Below is basic information regarding the types of funding the Township uses for open space and farmland preservation and how that funding source relates to the Township's open space fund.

Green Acres is a State fund that allows for the acquisition and development of property, but only one project can be done a year: either acquisition or park development, not both. Due to Delaware's rural location, park development projects do not qualify for grant funding, but the Township could apply for a 2% loan from the State. Green Acres works to preserve open space throughout the State. The Township can apply for funds on its own, or together with a non-profit land trust or the County. Green Acres funds up to 50% of the cost of a project, leaving the rest of the funding to come from an alternate source. Delaware Township has used the Township Open Space Trust Fund to match this funding.

The State Agriculture Development Committee (SADC) preserves farmland using a variety of methods. Often, the State provides money through the County, and the Township works with the County and State to purchase an easement on the land, thereby limiting future development on the property. The State can also purchase a farm outright, place an easement on the property to limit its use to farming in perpetuity, then resell the property. Or the SADC can purchase an easement without funding from the County or Township. If the Township is involved in acquiring the farm or farmland easement, the Township uses funds from the Township Open Space Trust Fund to match funding provided by the State and/or County. Much of the time, the Township provides 20% of a purchase, with the State and County providing the other 80% of the purchase price.

Hunterdon County has an Open Space Tax on all the properties in the County. This money is used in two ways. There is a portion that is used by Non-profit organizations and the Township to fund the acquisition of properties. There is a separate portion that is the Municipal Allocation of the Open Space Tax, which is returned to the Township for several uses. This money can be used to fund acquisitions of properties, payment of debt, or (once the Recreation Improvement and Maintenance Plan is approved by the Township Committee) it can be used for the purchase or maintenance of recreation facilities.

Finally, Delaware Township has an Open Space Tax which provides the funding for the Open Space Trust Fund. When the last increase to the fund was approved by residents in a referendum in 2006, the referendum and enabling ordinance stated that the money was to be used for the purchase of land, either Open Space or Farmland,

Well Testing Wrap Up

Despite the pandemic this year, 30 residents took advantage of the Community Well Test Event in September. The Delaware Township Environmental Commission wants to extend their thanks to everyone for their cooperation with the last minute changes to how this year's event was run in order to allow for social distancing.

If you were unable to participate in this year's event and don't want to wait until next fall to sample your well water, you can still sample your well water directly through Raritan Headwaters Association's (RHA) well test program at any time throughout the year. Sample kits can be order, picked up and then returned to RHA at their Flemington office.

Free Rabies Clinic: Dec 5, 2020

Pets must be on a leash or in a carrier. We will provide three- year rabies vaccination for pets 1 year old and over, or one- year vaccinations for pets under a year old. PLEASE CHECK YOUR RABIES CERTIFI-CATES TO SEE IF YOUR PET NEEDS A VAC-CINATION. To be licensed, Vaccinations CANNOT EXPIRE BEFORE NOV. 1st 2021.

For example if your rabies certificate expires 8/16/21 your pet needs to be vaccinated before you can receive the license.
